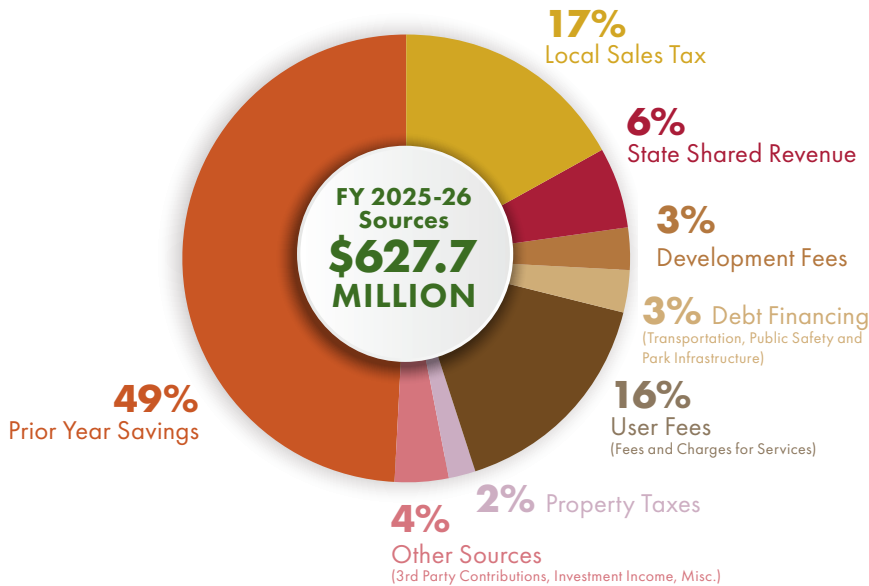


TOWN OF QUEEN CREEK

FY 2025-26 BUDGET

The Town of Queen Creek is required to pass a balanced budget annually. Expenditures must not exceed revenues. The budget is based on strategic and master plans that include community input and long-term goals.

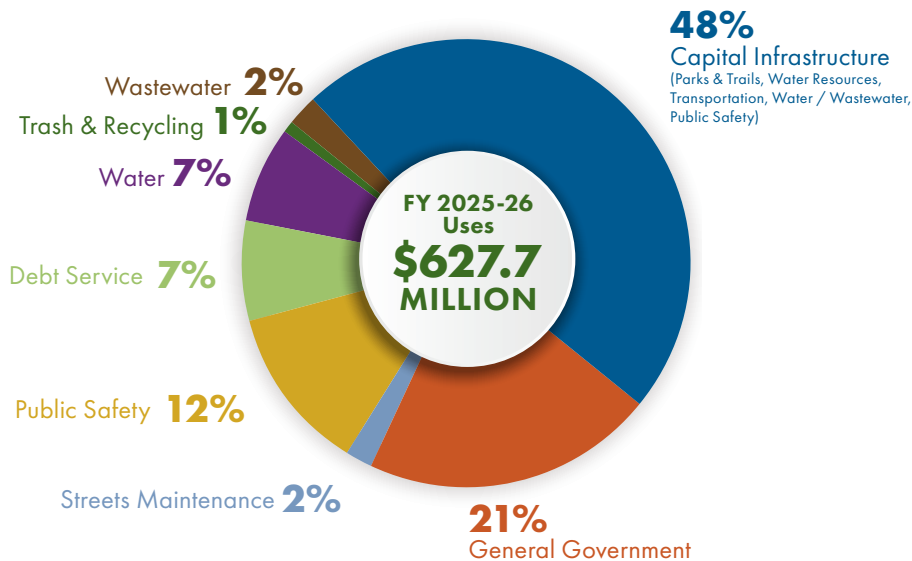
WHERE DOES THE MONEY COME FROM?



DID YOU KNOW?

The Town continues to evaluate opportunities to reduce taxes and fees for residents. **The FY26 budget includes the third year of the Council's property tax freeze policy, keeping property taxes the same for existing residents and businesses.** The budget also includes the elimination of the 0.25% Town Center sales tax.

DID YOU KNOW?

The FY26 budget is a 13% reduction from the previous year. While the budget has been reduced, the Town continues to prioritize infrastructure, with **nearly 50% of the budget dedicated to capital infrastructure.**

Incorporated in 1989, with a population of just over 2,100, the Town has grown to approximately 89,300 in 2025. 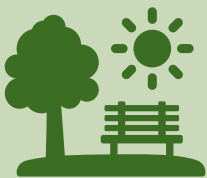
